

Love Is All You Need

Sending a message of love, unannounced, is a good principle for living — even if you don't happen to have a sweetheart. Simple acts of anonymous kindness, or kindness given in an understated way, can have a profound effect upon another person. Jesus approved of anonymous good works: 'When you give to the needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing' (Mt 6:3). The needy are not just the materially poor, but everyone who is in need of something, perhaps some kindness that only you can give them at that moment in time.

So this Valentine's Day, don't worry if you haven't got a current sweetheart of your own to love. Show your love, through an act of unannounced kindness, to someone else. Think of your neighbours, your friends, your church.... who would benefit from some simple compassion and support this month?

The Presentation of Christ In the Temple / Candlemas

In bygone centuries, Christians said their last farewells to the Christmas season on Candlemas, 2 February. This is exactly 40 days after Christmas Day itself.

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name, Candlemas.

The story of how Candlemas began can be found in Luke 2:22-40. Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is of course found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West. But in medieval times, the Nunc Dimittis was mostly used just on this day, during the distribution of candles before the Eucharist. Only gradually did it win a place in the daily prayer life of the Church.

Ash Wednesday

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday. But why 'Ash' Wednesday? The reason has to do with getting things right between you and God, and the tradition goes right back to the Old Testament.

In the Old Testament, the Israelites often sinned. When they finally came to their senses, and saw their evil ways as God saw them, they could do nothing but repent in sorrow. They mourned for the damage and evil they had done. As part of this repentance, they covered their heads with ashes. For the Israelites, putting ashes on your head, and even rending your clothes, was an outward sign of their heart-felt repentance and acknowledgement of sin. (See Genesis 18:27; 2 Samuel 13:19; Job 2:8, 30:19; Isaiah 58:5; Jeremiah 6:26; Jonah 3:6)

In the very early Christian Church, the yearly 'class' of penitents had ashes sprinkled over them at the beginning of Lent. They were turning to God for the first time, and mourning their sins. But soon many other Christians wanted to take part in the custom, and to do so at the very start of Lent. They heeded Joel's call to 'rend your hearts and not your garments' (Joel 2:12-19). Ash Wednesday became known as either the 'beginning of the fast' or 'the day of the ashes'.

The collect for today goes back to the Prayer Book, and stresses the penitential character of the day. It encourages us with the reminder of the readiness of God to forgive us and to renew us.

The Bible readings for today are often Joel 2:1-2, 12 – 18, Matthew 6: 1-6,16 – 21 and Paul's moving catalogue of suffering, "as having nothing and yet possessing everything." (2 Corinthians 5:20b - 6:10)

The actual custom of 'ashing' was abolished at the Reformation, though the old name for the day remained. Today, throughout the Church of England, receiving the mark of ashes on one's forehead is optional. Certainly the mark of ashes on the forehead reminds people of their mortality: "Remember that you are dust and to dust you will return..."

(Genesis 3:19)

The late medieval custom was to burn the branches used on Palm Sunday in the previous year in order to create the ashes for today.

The Collect for Ash Wednesday is:

Almighty and everlasting God, You hate nothing that you have made And forgive the sins of all those who are penitent:

Create and make in us new and contrite hearts

That we, worthily lamenting our sins And acknowledging our wretchedness, May receive from you, the God of all mercy,

Perfect remission and forgiveness; Through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, Who is alive and reigns with you, In the unity of the Holy Spirit, One God, now and for ever.

Ash Wednesday: A time to admit you are sorry

Have you done something which haunts you? Which makes you feel restless and defensive, every time you think of it? Why not deal with it this month, and put it behind you? Whatever your mistake has been, consider what the Bible has to say to you:

'I have not come to call the virtuous but sinners to repentance' (said Jesus). (Luke 5.32)

'Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon.' (Isaiah 55.7)

'Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing.' (Joel 2:12-13)

God is inviting you to come to him this Ash Wednesday. What a wonderful offer! Make the most of it, and remember how the prodigal son was welcomed back by his compassionate father.

As the season of Lent approaches, with its time of prayer and spiritual self-examination and stocktaking of ourselves before God, Prebendary Richard Bewes considers the way of the cross—and what that means for us.

Lent – the way of the Cross

(Luke 4: 1-13)



No one is immune! An old fable relates how the Devil was once crossing the Libyan Desert, and came across some trainee devils who were tempting a holy hermit. They had tried him with the lusts of the flesh, but to no avail. They attempted to put doubts into his mind; they told him that all his discipline was a waste of time. But all was useless – the holy man stayed holy!

The Devil then stepped forward. "Your methods are so crude," he laughed — "so ham-fisted. Permit me!" Going up to the hermit, he said, "Heard the good news? Your brother has just been made bishop of Alexandria!" It was only then that the face of the holy man began to twist and contort with jealousy and hurt pride.

Evil knows plenty of ways in which to attack a person's character. In Luke's account of the temptations of Jesus out in the wilderness, the Devil had recourse to a number of ploys:

'Satisfy your appetite's desires and turn that stone into bread!....No? Then take a look at the great kingdoms of this world.

Empires, armies and navies, banks and businesses - all yours, for just one little bow to me.... No? Come then to the pinnacle of Jerusalem's temple. You could do a power miracle as you throw yourself off the top and let the angels catch you. People will be thrilled – it'll be a sure way to gain all the converts you want!'

But Jesus is adamant. 'Jerusalem? I'll get to Jerusalem sure enough one day. But Satan, I didn't come to join you in a partnership. I came to beat you. And it will be by way of a journey to Jerusalem's Cross that I shall build my kingdom.'

Christian – learn from the Lord! Even the novice believer has power – in the words of the old Prayer Book – to beat down Satan under our feet.

If we have problems, it is not in any lack of power, but rather in our low level of motivation - when we do not wish to win! It is through prayer, the Scriptures, Christian fellowship, worship and the Lord's Supper that we can gain such a vision of Christ our Leader, that the motivation is raised – to the winning level!

It is no sin to be tempted. There is a way back if we fall. Learn the lesson for the next time!


