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Rector's Report

Looking back on such an active year for Holy Cross Church, my thanks as always go to you, the parishioners, who have offered support in both prayerful, practical and financial ways to the church and wider community and who have carried out the maintenance and cleaning of our buildings and resources with excellence. Special thanks to Jill & Gerald our Church Wardens, Mike our Treasurer and all members of Church Council who have supported and continued to help steer us in the right direction. My thanks also to our media team, musicians, and rostered Lay Teams for their dedication and contribution to our worship, and to Peter Bowman for producing our excellent Church magazine every month.

Our Church family is blessed with great love and diverse characters that come with their own unique gifts and abilities willingly used for Gods glory. Over the past year many have joined together in care, prayer, worship, nurture, study & welcome and the year has held a mixture of joyous blessings. We have shared laughter and fellowship, generous giving, thoughtfulness, outreach and growth sprinkled with just a few frustrations and some sadness.

Our Worship services have continued to embrace both traditional and contemporary styles along with some combined services that have been an inspiration and a joy. Throughout the year, we have seen several new families join the 9:30am service however one of our frustrations has been that the critical mass of people at this service is not quite enough at the present time to welcome and sustain them long term. Sadly I suspect it is because of low numbers at the service that we have also seen some of them come & then drift away. Attendance at Families @ Five, WOW and Sunday Club has continued to fluctuate greatly during the year and so much prayer is needed for a clear way forward in this area.

On a brighter note this year we have been pleased to welcome Rae, our student in training and have enjoyed travelling with her along her journey. Together we have all rejoiced in promoting Back to Church Sunday, Celebrating Holy Cross Day, Harvest Festival, Mothering Sunday and a selection of unique Easter & Christmas Services. These enjoyable events were all well attended and my thanks go to all who have promoted the unity of the church offering a warm welcome to those who come. For the first time on All Souls Day we held a Memorial & Thanksgiving Service for our loved ones who had died and an invitation went out to those whose funerals had taken place in the previous year. As we watched over 100 candles being lit each representing a personal loved one it was very moving and a stark reminder of all those we have known and loved who now rest in Christ.

Our mid week Communion Service on Wednesdays at 9:30am continues to attract a small number of faithful people who appreciate the informal style and relaxed atmosphere that this service provides and the good quality tea/coffee and yummy things that follow!

Outreach to the community has been active throughout 2009 starting at the beginning of the year with a well attended Alpha Course with an 'Away Day' at Penola by the Sea. The Easter Lent Course was also well attended and a very powerful reminder of Gods' limitless love for us. The DVD was excellent and the conversation stimulating and challenging.

We have also shared some great Mission Events, Fundraising and Social occasions throughout the year including: the Church Fete (complete with parachuting teddies), Quilt Exhibition, Quiz Night, Jumble Sales, Games evening, Meet the Teddies and Teddy Bears picnic, Harvest Festival & Auction, Shoeboxes appeal, Film nights, Music on McLean, Pancake Party, Easter Event for Kids, Church Dinners, etc. All of these have given us a great opportunity for fellowship & Outreach so thank you to everyone involved in making these not only most enjoyable but also great witness/fundraisers for the church.

I am pleased to report that my own family's permanent visas finally came through this year which ended over two years of uncertainty. Thank you for your love & support through this time and also through my recuperation after my operation. We can now focus on the future as we seek Gods vision together and share in all of the exciting things that God has planned for us here at Holy Cross.

I have found Holy Cross to be a loving & caring church, a welcoming church and a prayerful and faithful church, may it always be so. My fondest love to you all,

Wardens' Report

From a Wardens point of view, we see the past year as being both challenging and rewarding and through all these various moments, the strength and dedication of the parish community has ensured our worshipping community continues to be caring and loving.

All our buildings continue to be free of any significant maintenance issues and all our grounds have continued to be well kept and tidy.

Parish members will be aware of the problem we have been having with the sliding door leading into the church. Also there is the issue of water entering the meeting room located in the South west corner of the site. Church council has these items in hand and it is anticipated the new church council will attend to these items as soon as it is practicable.

We have continued to benefit from both the Church and the Church hall being used by others which brings the community to us as well as a source of income.

We have had the signage added to the front of the building which has lifted our community profile and also we have had the replacement of the street signage which also adds to our community profile. Internally we have added notice boards which allow users of our facilities to see the various activities of the church. All these add to our outreach to the wider community.

The storage racks which have been installed in the old entrance area has enabled the area to be better utilised and also has addressed our need to be aware of Occupational Health &Safety obligations as set out in the Diocese guidelines.

The wardens would like to thank everyone for their contributions and commitment to the operation and mission of our worshipping community – Reaching out into the community with Christ.

Treasurer's Report

The Financial statement for the past year is a bit of a disappointment to me as the Parish has put in a lot of extra effort in fundraising this year to try and offset the anticipated deficit of \$15000.00 which was in the budget. As you can see the deficit was in fact much bigger than we expected, some \$19,100

The main reason for this is in our giving programme which was under budget by around \$4,500 however this was offset to some extent by the increase in fundraising of around \$3,700. It is pleasing to note that the tennis court continues to bring in \$4,782 about \$300 over budget. All in all we actually achieved our budgeted income of \$93,450 so why is the deficit larger than expected?

I believe we have done a good job in keeping our expenses under control with most areas coming in on or under budget. We have however spent money in improving the Signage on the Church and buying new office furniture for some \$2,700. We have also paid the final Synod assessment instalment on the Blackman Bequest of \$2,661. These two amounts of \$5,361 explain the increase in the deficit of \$3,832

I believe that next year we need to look closely at our Income & Expenditure as we cannot continue to maintain a deficit of \$15,000 for much longer. In looking at this financial statement there are very few areas in our expenditure where we can save money. Areas other than the Donations to Chaplaincy & Missions (where we could save money) are very hard to find and I don't think we want as a Parish to not support these.

This only leaves one alternative and that is an increase in our Income. No doubt next year we will continue with our Fund Raising much the same as this year but can we substantially increase this area? I really don't think so!

This then only leaves our personal giving commitments as an area where we can achieve an increase in our Income and I believe we need to really concentrate on this during the coming year to achieve at least our budgeted figure of around \$55,000

The signage for the front of our church, together with notice board and posters is completed with many positive comments, and the Minutes recorded successful fund-raising events held, including Harvest Festival, dinner at TAFE, Annual Fete, Quilt Exhibition and another successful 'Music on McLean'.

At the March meeting the sad passing of Parish Council member John Smith-Gander was recorded and his fellow members paused to reflect on the exceptional contribution John made to the Church Council and the work of the Church.

Rev'd Mark Arney has done a great job visiting some of the shopkeepers in Willagee and has already received some donations. However much more is needed and the Council have had a set of printed promotional material to give prospective donors. Arrangements for the Chaplaincy Dinner on August 14th are being discussed by Council, it would be wonderful if you would support it.

The collection of papers has ceased. We been unable to find someone to take on this task, it raised a large amount of revenue and so is a sad loss. We are still praying and hoping that someone will come forward and we would appreciate your prayers.

Gerda and Anne-Marie (Bicton Primary and Caralee Community schools respectively) have increasing numbers of students becoming involved with local retirement villages and hostels. This is proving wonderful for both the students and the elderly in these facilities.

Brad (Palmyra Primary), Annie (Melville High), Jenny (Booragoon Primary) and Vicky (Kardinya Primary) continue to do amazing work. It is encouraging to hear the way they work to gain the trust and confidence of students, and just how they help and support the students in so many ways.

On behalf of the Council, I would like to thank all those who donate weekly and would encourage others to consider what they might do to help. We need to continue to put our trust in the Lord that he will continue lead us, and provide what is needed to continue with this very important work.

Children's Ministry - Sunday Club

Sunday Club is evolving, changing and adapting to the needs of the children and their families. We often see new faces however turning them into regular faces is another challenge.

We have up to 12 regular attendees and about 30 children who attend special services and festivals such as 'Walking through Easter Day". On occasions we have had the children remain in the Church for the 9.30 service and sometimes at the joint 9am service, they appeared to have worked well. It almost seems to be less disruptive than having them go in and out during the service. We have also tried a new format of having several activities on offer, allowing different age groups to do their own thing, this also works well. Our challenge is to find the recipe to meet the needs of all the children and come up with a formula that will encourage more children to attend more regularly.

Feedback from the families who call Holy Cross their church – feel supported and the kids certainly appear to enjoy their time at church. Our challenge is to find the recipe to meet the needs of a demanding society on our young families. We not only need to nurture the young ones but provide an environment where parents are comfortable and receive the sustenance they need to grow in their faith.

Please pray for the families and for the people providing leadership that they may bake a Worshiping community cake that provides the right levels of love, teaching, patience and inspiration to the whole family.

Cursillo Report



This is just a very short report, because, as with last year, we have again not been very active this year. However it is important that we endeavour to find the time to meet, at least quarterly, and we will try and ensure that this happens. These times of fellowship are very important and we should not let the seemingly speed of time passing allow us to become complacent about this special time of renewal.

We have 25 Cursillistas at Holy Cross and would encourage anyone who has not yet experienced these special few days in communion with other Christians, to consider doing so. The number of participants attending Cursillo increased again this past year, which is heartening, and includes gatherings in the country area, where the numbers are gradually growing.

Some of you may not be familiar with Cursillo. The word Cursillo means 'A Short Course in Christian Living" and is something that needs to be experienced to be understood. It is not intended to be a means to bring newcomers to the faith, rather it is renewal and recommitment for the faithful. Think of it as a special time and space given over to sharing fellowship with our Lord, and with others who are doing the same. There are now well over 2000 people from parishes in Western Australia who have attended Cursillo.


Lastly, thanks to everyone who donates various items that we are able to sell - without you the sales would not be so successful.

Home Groups: Morton's Bible Study Group

Our group has continued to meet over the past year primarily on a Monday evening starting at 7pm, except for holidays, sickness and other responsibilities. We are blessed that all members of this group are still together and this has been encouraging as it has been a challenging year for some members. We are blessed in that all members are able to share thoughts and ideas in an environment of trust, care, objectivity, friendship and confidentiality.

Through the past year we have continued to use the "Life Guide Bible Studies" and various DVD/VHS/Television resources. In particular we studied:-

Decisions: We completed the last 8 of these 9 studies that walked through Christian decision makers of the Bible and how these can be applied to the modern day.

Pleasing God: 9 studies where we explored what it really means to please God and learn why faith in Christ is the foundation of such a life.

For Lent: We studied 'Bread in The Wilderness' by Kenneth H Carter Jr. We found this to be a very challenging journey of study where we were guided by excellent dialog that encouraged us to look at many "familiar Easter texts" in a new way.

I also participated in the parish Lenten study 'the Easter experience'. This excellent DVD guided study was again challenging in that; in a similar way, a familiar story was presented in a manner that challenged our current understanding and interpretation of Jesus' last days. Our group discussed parts of this also as it paralleled our group study.

Topical Religious Commentary DVD/VHS and television sources. The Star of Bethlehem was a recent television documentary that revealed irrefutable scientific support of the biblical story along with the growth of the presenter's faith because of it.

Also we viewed King David, Mysteries of the Bible (5 DVD's) and Son of God. All these were presented in a way that made all of us consider events of the bible in a different light.

Throughout the studies, we reflected on the Old Testament prophesies and messages of the New Testament as they may be applied in the modern day.

Order of St Luke (2)

The aims of the Order of St Luke are:-

Our meetings take place every third Wednesday of the month at 7:30pm. All are welcome to attend.

Women's Support & Study Group

Originally called Wednesday Women (although we have changed the day we meet) this small group set out to provide a few hours of bible and prayer focussed fellowship for busy women.
