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## Rector's Report

My sincere thanks to all who contribute, often sacrificially, in order to keep Church of the Holy Cross 'open' for the business of God. Special thanks go to our Wardens Jill Bowman & Gerald Morton, our Church Council, all those who serve on church rosters and to the many who quietly go about the business of the church, often unseen but deeply appreciated. Without you all we would not have such a lovely Church building and grounds or be able to achieve many of the things that God calls us to do in and around our community.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank all you who pray regularly for my ministry and family and to the prayer group who have been praying for the growth and commitment within the church and for our young families. Your prayers are truly appreciated and they really do make a difference so I urge you to please continue.

This last year has been a busy and productive one. We have shared in some wonderful studies, services and events including the Church Quiz, Fete, Jumbles, Table Tops, Shared meals, Christingle, Christmas, Easter, Pentecost, Exploring God's Mercy Lent Course, Living the Questions Study Course etc. Mainly music has been one of our exciting ventures this year and is very much appreciated by all the parents, grandparents and children who attend. Also the newly formed Men's Group has been a welcome addition to our church program and I hope that this will also continue to be a blessing to all who attend.

With council's encouragement and blessing a small but dedicated team have been in conversation and meetings with Willagee Church in a joint effort to promote and execute mission in and to the local community and beyond. Together they have been exploring what the needs are and looking at ways that together we can reach out and make a difference. This is a partnership that I hope will continue to flourish.

The residents at St Ives continue to support and appreciate the Communion Services that we hold at their village twice a month and our numbers have picked up in the last year. It is always a pleasure to meet with the residents at St Ives and to share informal conversations with them before and after the service.

## Rector's Report (continued)

As we approach the coming financial year there are many things that we could focus on as a church not least the cementing of a truly 'all age' church, I am all too aware that there is a generation missing in our congregation and this should be and is a concern for all of us. In addition to your prayers for a God given solution to this, I ask for your prayerful consideration and focus on these two additional areas over the coming year:

1. As the church of Christ I'm sure you will agree that we are called to unity in all of our diversity and so I hold that it is important for us to come together on occasion to worship, celebrate and share fellowship. This is imperative not only for our own full spiritual nurture and growth, but also for and the honest and wholesome witness and growth of the church. We are aware that each of us have our own preferences for study and worship and that we may even prefer to attend the things that we 'enjoy' or 'get something out of' but Jesus teaches us that being Christian is not only about what we get out of things but also and, perhaps even more importantly, about what we can 'offer' or 'give' to others. With this in mind I therefore urge you to prayerfully commit to immersing yourself into the whole life of the church, making the commitment to attend church studies instead of, or even as well as individual home groups during Lent and to support joint services and events not only with your presence but also with a generous spirit of love, welcome and fellowship. Let us share fellowship with one another and love our brothers and sisters as Christ has loved us. Please never underestimate how important your attendance is at all church events and how valuable your contributions are to the life of the church, without your attendance and support we are all diminished and lose out. Also never forget that your presence and 'Christ like' participation at church events is a fantastic witness to all in our community and beyond not only of His love but also of His benefits.
2. Not many of us ever enjoy talking about money but sadly the financial concerns and pressures on the church are great and it's true to say that we like many at the present time are struggling to stay afloat. If it were not for generous legacies of those who have gone before we would not even have been able to pay our bills over the last year and I am sorry to say that I believe the outreach and mission of the church has suffered because of our shortfall.

## Rector's Report (continued)

Your Church Council is aware that the money has not been available for spending on 'extras' and this sadly equates to lack of ministry training opportunities, evangelistic material, outreach initiatives etc. all I believe to the detriment of the church. We must not allow this to continue into 2012. I'm sure we are aware that the benefit of the churches existence far out way anything that can be brought with mere money and yet this is not reflected always in our giving. I do not believe that this is because we do not want to give but rather that some of us have not fully thought about the impact our sacrificial giving has on the life of the church. Our 'offertory' or 'giving' not only pays the bills of the church. Heating, lighting, water, cleaning materials, photocopying, rates, copyright, telephone, insurance Stipend etc. etc. but also enables us to provide resources for ministry training and outreach. Without an increase in our giving it follows that it will not be long before we do not have the reserves left to bail us out. Please join me in praying that this year will see an up- turn in our giving and that we will exercise wise and generous stewardship of all those things that God has provided for us to enjoy and share. Please also consider whether you might sign up for direct giving through the bank as this not only generates regular income for the church enabling our Treasurer to budget for the year but also saves the church money on the purchase of giving envelopes.

As we enter this next phase in the life of Holy Cross Church I pray that more and more will come to know and share the love of Christ with us and that each one of you will be richly blessed in your life and ministry.

You will all have noticed that we now have a new code lock on the rear door and the sliding doors are now working very well. The garden is looking great in spite of the very hot weather. All these works are undertaken by a variety of people – things just happen and as wardens we appreciate everyone's effort and to this end would like to thank everyone for their continued support and commitment to our worshipping community.

## Treasurer's Report

The Parish Financial Statement for the past year shows a deficit between our Income and Expenditure of \$17,045 which is slightly over the budgeted deficit of \$16,818. Our Income this year was below budget by some \$2,520 however our expenses were under budget by \$1,783.

On looking at the income figures you will see that we fell well short of budget in the Giving Envelopes and Open Plate the shortfall being \$5,617. Although our envelope giving exceeded the previous years the open plate fell well short. Maybe I was a little too optimistic with the budget figure hoping for 10% increase on last year in the envelopes but I feel this is an area we need to concentrate on in the coming year. Our other income has held up very well and it is good to see the money that the Hall use & Tennis Court are generating. Overall our fundraising was good with the Jumble Sales, Fete, Quiz Night etc all being a success.

On the expense side you can see that in most areas we were under our budget but the main problem the Parish has is the cost of renting the house at Donavon Rise some \$20,000. The Parish Council and The Diocese are presently discussing ways how we might overcome this.

## Secretary's Report

I attended and recorded the Minutes for all eight Church Council meetings which were confirmed as a true record of events taking place, signed by Rev. Debbie and filed in the Minute Book.

In June 2010 your Parish Council approved the purchase of the "Mainly Music" and "Living the Questions" programmes. "Mainly Music" has proved to be very successful and commenced on the 21st July. Since then it has gone from strength to strength and proved to be very popular with toddlers, their mothers and/or grandparents.

Also in June two of the newest Parish Council members in Joy and Renee volunteered to jointly be the "go to" people for local and international mission matters. Since then the Minutes recorded that they have set up a prayer group, formed an association with Willagee Anglican Church, arranged with the Mothers' Union for joint meetings and assisted with Caralee Primary School Friday Breakfast Club in the holidays and there are plans for a Reading Group with children one hour per week.

In February the Minutes recorded the commencement of a Men's Group, who are meeting approximately every 6 – 8 weeks.

The Minutes also recorded several fund-raising events including two Quiz Nights, the Harvest Festival Auction and the annual Fete which raised much needed funds for the Parish.

It has been an absolute pleasure for me to record the Minutes for the past three years, and my best wishes go to Revd Debbie and the incoming Parish Council.

## **Chaplaincy Report (Melville YouthCare Council)**

I must preface this year's report by once again by thanking all our Chaplains for the incredible work they are doing in our schools. Just reading the reports I post on the Notice Board in the hall really only scratches the surface of their involvement. Listening to their updates at each meeting, hearing their stories and learning about the many and various situations they deal on a day-to-day basis, is simply amazing. The Chaplains are indeed a very special group of people, and the work they do just confirms the need to keep, and even increase this resource in our schools.

It would also be remiss of me not to express the sincere thanks, on behalf of the Chaplains and the Committee, to all in our parish who donate regularly to keep Chaplains in our schools. I can assure you that your help is much appreciated by the Chaplains – they are very grateful for your support.

On the news front, Reverend Mark Arney has resigned as Chairman of the Melville YouthCare Council to take up the position as Anglican Chaplain to Prisons on 7th March. Mark has wanted to do this work for a long time and so we wish him well in his new challenge.

YouthCare also welcomed Dawn France as the new Area Chaplain, and David Ladner as the YouthCare Council's Field Officer.

One of the best initiatives of the Howard Government was a commitment to continue and increase the School Chaplaincy program. However, this program is now facing constitutional change. A Toowoomba man is opposing Commonwealth funding of Chaplains in state school. His Secular Lobby and its supporters, are actively behind him in this challenge.

There is now an area on the Church hall notice board for Chaplaincy notices. I will post the Chaplains' Reports after each meeting so you can understand about the work they do in their respective schools. A financial statement will also be posted so all can see how we are travelling with our finances and where your donations are directed.

## Chaplaincy Report (continued)

I placed a copy of the circular outlining the details of this Secular Lobby activity, on the notice board in the hall. Copies of this report and an explanation of the steps we can take to be part of a nationwide push to defend the valuable work done by Chaplains in our schools, were also distributed. I hope and pray that as many people as possible from our Parish registered their support for the continuation of Chaplaincy in our schools.

Even with funding provided by Government, we still need to engage in an ongoing fundraising program. As part of this program, apples were available for sale earlier this month and proved, as always, a very good fundraiser. The apples are straight from the orchards in Donnybrook and are always lovely and tasty.

We have also been granted two Saturday sausage sizzles at Bunnings Melville – one was held earlier this month, and another is scheduled for September.

On the 13th of August, a Chaplaincy Dinner will be held in the Holy Cross Hall. This is not only an excellent fundraising event, but also an enjoyable social function. So please do mark this date down in your diary. We sat about 93 people in the hall last year, and those who attended enjoyed themselves so much that it was hard to get them to leave!

## Children's Ministry Report

It is a little concerning that the children are predominately girls – as a parish it would be great if we can pray for more families and particular for families with a few boys, a balance makes for a healthy community.

Positive feedback followed the Easter Sunday Service. There were 20 children and they had a great time. Families indicated that they enjoyed the service having a celebratory feel and being inclusive of the children. The chat following the service was enjoyed by all.

Our challenge for the future is to ensure we are generous enough to perhaps give up some of the traditions we enjoy as older Christians and to be more inclusive of the younger generation. We have such a short window of opportunity to plant the seeds of faith in the children. It would be such a shame if we can't offer them what they need above our own desires.

Please continue to prayer for the children's ministry team and the families that bring children into our worshipping community.

## Media Ministry Team Report

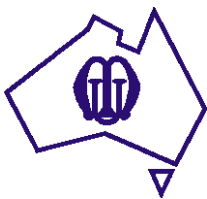

## Current Issues

Two meetings have taken place concerning the change of the monthly service because Wednesday is the evening when all parishes have their parish functions and various other commitments. Thursday evening is the temporary and current evening of choice. The rationale for the change is the focus of increasing membership. It is acknowledged that whilst there is need for change, change is a painful process. It is the chaplains plan to consider having a daytime service in the future.

A standard service has been developed and will continue to be developed, using the OSL Handbook as a guideline. A new format of prayer list has been developed, thanks to the input of Revd. Charles Brookes, Mrs Norma Tebutt and the chaplain. A copy of the service along with the chaplain's reflection is provided for members who cannot attend services. A copy of the service is being currently shared with an overseas person who has emailed to express gratitude.

A Christmas card with greetings from OSL and Holy Cross Parish Church was sent to army personnel serving overseas in December 2010.

The OSL service is advertised in the local community paper and a flyer is displayed in the local shopping centre. Flyers are sent electronically to all the local clergy. Copies of all flyers, notices to the community newspaper, services and prayer lists are on file. Invitations have been issued for the chaplain to address the Mothers Union and CPE students in May 2011.

Pastoral visits are made to hospitalised members and those confined to their homes. Pastoral visits to lone members within the metropolitan are yet to be made.

There has been one guest speaker to date, Mr Julian Silburn who spoke about Aboriginal healing through the music of the didgeridoo. For some this was something of a challenge whilst for others it proved to be a mystical experience.

At the time of writing this report, the chaplain holds some concerns about the future of the Perth Melville chapter, in view of the faithful aging members. No expressions of interest for membership have been received during the past year.

The chaplain has clearly stated that her term of office as Lay Chaplain is for three years, this expires on October 2013.

You are now also able to order your Entertainment Books through the website. If you use Facebook or Twitter you can now become a friend or follow us so that you will always be up to date. Twitter can also be used as a Live RSS feed.

The church magazine is still published online, along with our annual report document and you will find the readings for our services are also updated each month. There is also an online diary which gives details of church events and hall bookings. Mel Austen continues to do a great job keeping our Photo Album up to date.

I am in process of completely rebuilding the site and now would be a good time to add new features if they are wanted. If you have any suggestions of things you may like to see, perhaps a message board, an 'Ask the Rector' feature or perhaps a memorial section for example, please let me know.
