## Parish Council Report Meeting 9<sup>th</sup> August 2015

#### **Filling Of Vacancies**

 Parish Council still to fill one Synod Rep. Revd. Julie still to appoint one Warden and two Parish Councillors.

#### **Business Arising**

- Faculty approved for plaque Acknowledging Original Custodians so will now purchase.
- About half the chocolates already sold.
- New set of Statutes ordered and will be available for Synod.
- Diocese has refused permission to establish a Parish Doctor/Nurse role. Looking at other options to embrace this particular ministry.

#### **Locum Priest's Report**

- Baptism service went smoothly.
   Revd. Julie suggested we be mindful
  of the various dietary requirements
  at morning teas etc. and ensure we
  provide fruit and other healthy
  options.
- Revd. Julie formed a small Worship and Liturgy team of herself, Emma Charlton, Lillian Daniels and Jill Bowman to plan significant worship events coming up between now and the end of the year. Team met on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> August and developed plans for Fathers' Day (6<sup>th</sup> September), Blessing of Pets (11<sup>th</sup> October) and Harvest Festival (15<sup>th</sup> November).

- Harvest Festival parishioners bring gifts and food to later be distributed to preferably an Anglican organisation for their Christmas hampers. (More details to come.)
- Revd. Julie on retreat from after Church Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> August to Wednesday afternoon.
- Revd. Julie on a week's leave from 10<sup>th</sup> - 16<sup>th</sup> September. Archdeacon Lionel Snell will take the service on 13<sup>th</sup> September.

#### Warden's Report

- Sign requesting no donations be left outside Church now on entrance door.
- Faculty approved to install a hand rail at Tennis Court Steps:
- Faculty approved to install a door on servery window.
- City of Melville acknowledged our street sign removed in error. Have requested it be replaced.
- Mainly music families have been invited to Celebration Sunday as have friends of Holy Cross we may not have seen for a while. Parish Council approved a budget of \$250 for face painting and \$200 for additional food if needed.
- The initial nine on planning team for Mini Market now only three. Flyers have been printed - a poster prepared for out the front – and an advert will be put on Gumtree.

## Parish Council Report (cont'd)

- The gutters have been cleared but it was not possible to see where the leak was coming into the Church.
   With recent rain should now be possible so can get repairs done.
- A hairline crack has appeared on northern wall between window and going up wall – plus another one on the eastern side. To repair will need cleaning out and filling and painting. Repairs to be done.
- Possibility of fencing off the grassed area near the tennis courts. This could then be promoted for birthday parties. There would be a gate either end so public access still possible. Have received an offer to provide labour free. Asking for firm quote for materials.

#### **Treasurer's Report**

- All bills have been paid. Following negotiations with the City of Melville the Grant Repayment was reduced from \$6,187 to \$4,443
- The First quarter results were presented & they were better than budget.

#### **Holy Cross Diamond Jubilee**

 Given there has not been a lot of practical support forthcoming for this event, it was agreed that if there was no further response within two weeks then the initial plan will be abandoned and Parish Council can plan a smaller celebration.

#### Children's Ministry

- KidsPlus+ recommenced for six weeks on 6<sup>th</sup> August. Eight children attended.
- Sunday Club will reactivate
   acknowledging children's birthdays –
   and a small gift to children being
   baptised. Children will also be given
   a small gift at Christmas. Current
   budget of \$30 per month should
   cover proposed children's ministry
   expenses.

#### The Way Forward – Fresh Expressions

- Happy Hour still scheduled for Friday 18<sup>th</sup> September.
- Fresh Expressions Leadership Team hope to meet 13<sup>th</sup> or 25<sup>th</sup> August.
- Need to be more attentive to our welcoming and hospitality – especially on special occasions but also every Sunday. Very few parishioners were around for morning tea after the baptism to chat with guests and help with hospitality.
- Craft Church starting slowly but Lyn Ferguson committed to keep offering the group in the hope it will build up. Proposed to advertise in local paper.

## **Holy Cross Day**

(celebrated 14<sup>th</sup> September)

On Holy Cross Day the Church celebrates the Cross as a symbol of triumph, as the sign of Christ's victory over death. Holy Cross Day goes right back to 14 September 335, and we have the mother of a Roman Emperor to thank for it.

Helena was a devout Christian, and after her son, Constantine, was converted, they agreed that she should travel from Rome to Israel, and seek out the places of special significance to Christians.

Of course, much of Jerusalem had been destroyed by the Romans around 135 AD. But even so, Helena finally located what she believed to be the sites of the Crucifixion and of the Burial (and modern archaeologists think she may well be correct). The sites were so close together that she built one large church over them - the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

That church, built in honour of the Cross, was dedicated on 14 September 335.

The sign of the Cross has been used by Christians since early times. Tertullian, writing his De Corona (3:2) around AD 211, noted that Christians seldom did anything significant without making the sign of the cross.

What is its significance? Well, people often put their initials or some sort of personal mark on something to show that it belongs to them. The Cross is the personal mark of our Lord Jesus Christ, and we mark it on ourselves as a sign that we belong to him. Even in the book of Revelation, we read that the servants of God are 'sealed' or 'marked' on their foreheads as a sign that they are his.

A preacher once put it this way: if you were explaining to someone how to make a cross, you would say: "Draw an I." That is you standing before the Lord, saying, 'here I am'. Then cancel that vertical stroke with a horizontal stroke — as if to say: "Lord, I abandon my selfwill and make you the centre of my life instead. I abandon myself to your love and service."

On Holy Cross Day, we recall Jesus' wonderful promise: "And when I am lifted up, I will draw all men unto me." (John 12:32)



## Beating Your Wife While Going To Church

In a fascinating paper at the Kuala Lumpur Lausanne Researchers' Conference, Philip Hughes, Director of the Australian Christian Research Centre, gave the results from two questions asked in the 2012 World Values' Survey. One of the questions in this survey was whether the beating of one's wife was sometimes or always justifiable — an extraordinary question to ask at the best of times. It also asked its more usual question on whether the respondent attended religious services and, if so, how often.

Sadly, answers to these questions were only available from 49 or around a quarter (23%) of the countries in the world, although they did cover every continent, and the countries included accounted for half (49%) of the world's population. Even so the answers are interesting.

Across the world apparently 15% of men feel that beating their wife is sometimes or always justifiable. This percentage does not vary according to whether or not they attend church, except in Africa where the percentage is 19% for those who don't attend and 22% for those who do, and in South America where the percentages are respectively 5% and 7%! In North America it's the other way round – 10% if the men don't attend church and 7% of those who do. In Oceania (3%), Europe (11%) and Asia (16%) churchgoing makes no difference.

The Asian contribution is high because of its large population – without them the rest of the world averages 12%.

In a few countries, going to church appeared to make things worse! In Germany, for instance, 8% who didn't go to church felt wife beating was acceptable, but it was 16% for those who did! Likewise in Lebanon and Algeria the churchgoers were more in favour of beating their wives than nongoers. In some "Christian" countries there was a high level of acceptance of wife beating, for example, Rwanda (38%) and the Philippines (33%)!

And some statistics from an Australian Parliamentary Research Paper "Domestic violence in Australia: a quick guide to the issues" published in October 2014.

- 1 in 6 Australian women had experienced physical or sexual violence from a current or former partner
- 1 in 19 Australian men had experienced physical or sexual violence from a current or former partner
- 1 in 4 Australian women had experienced emotional abuse by a current or former partner
- 1 in 7 Australian men had experienced emotional abuse by a current or former partner.

#### On church management consultants

Rotas are irrelevant, as whatever is written down never bears the slightest resemblance to reality anyway. As soon as someone finds that they are booked on a certain date to read a lesson, make coffee, or mow the churchyard, they immediately book a holiday for that week.

If we are lucky, they may find a replacement - apart from one occasion. Major Hastings was unable to read the lessons on a certain day, so he booked another, then forgot and booked a second person. Cometh the day, they both went to the lectern and neither would give way, so we had the lessons read by two people. It would not have been too bad if they read at the same pace, but they got ever more out of phase as the reading progressed, one having returned to his pew while the other was still doggedly finishing the last few verses.

I did, however, greatly appreciate your team's advice on time efficiency. From now on, on Sunday mornings, the lessons will be read while the hymns are sung, the collection taken while the anthem is given and the sermon preached while the notices are delivered. In future, we should get through Mattins in twelve and a half minutes.
