

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
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NEARLY CHRISTMAS 2021

CHRISTMAS DEVOTION

We have a God who is constantly on the move... It may not appear like that, within any given moment, but HIS movement is there... The Old Testament tells us that this coming movement is, within God's overall plan of salvation, towards a critical moment in history. Hear, "For Zion's sake I (the LORD) will not keep silent, and for Jerusalem's sake I will not be quiet until her righteousness goes forth as brightness, and her salvation as a burning torch." (Is 62:1). There we find the faithfulness and the persistence of our God, who constantly moves to bring righteousness and justice, praise and peace. But what does that say to us?

Today we celebrate that critical moment in history towards which God had been moving - the "where and the when" - in bringing about that plan. Yes, it took a while for some to catch on, and we would have been no different. One of the reasons for this was that God's way so different to their expectation - mind-boggling differences, and so often we resist such movement to change. The Word made flesh "did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but made himself nothing...taking the form of a servant... And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross."

[Edited Philippians 2:6-8 (ESV)... Who would have expected someone like that? The people in those days didn't. They expected a war-like Messiah!

A Christian friend and his wife were invited to minister in an Aboriginal community. On arrival, they found that there were two hostile groups. Both groups expected him to minister to each group separately. That was unsettling. It was not what it was all about. They prayed about it and got Paul's words. "I appeal to you...that all of you agree and that there be no divisions among you...be united in the same mind..." (1 Corinthians 1:10 (ESV)

The next morning, he invited the two leaders to meet with him, shared the text he had received, and told the leaders that he and his wife would not stay for either meeting, but would fly out.

Just then a big, old yellow dog sauntered up to a large wooden cross stuck in the ground, and deliberately lifted his leg. "What followed is hard to describe but it went something like this; firstly, a look of incredulity and something like horror as we recognised that God was drawing our attention to our behaviour, then shame broke the tension between us all, and love and forgiveness began to flow. The two groups joined together and we had the most precious (time) seeing many...finding resurrection life in Jesus and many touched by the Spirit in healing and deliverance." Who would have expected anything like that? But that is the essence of what God is about, why He moves, why the Word became flesh, why we celebrate Christmas - to bring healing and reconciliation, so we become reconciled reconcilers.

This is the sort of thing that Isaiah was talking about, looking forward to - the movement of God, the expectation of the Messiah, and hence the coming Kingdom of God. Although Isaiah focuses in on Zion (by which he means Jerusalem) because Zion, the Torah (law) and the temple are the heart of God's people, where all this will happen. The glory shall return and "they shall be called The Holy People, The Redeemed of the Lord; and you shall be called Sought Out, A City Not Forsaken." (Isaiah 62:12 (ESV). But don't think it begins and ends there, for this movement is for all nations. It is for all peoples, for the outcast, the refugees, the poor. "Go through...prepare the way for the people; build up, build up the highway; clear it of stones; lift up a signal over the peoples. Behold, the Lord has proclaimed to the end of the earth: Say to the daughter of Zion, "Behold, your salvation comes..." (Isaiah 62:10-11 (ESV). Yet within the unexpected, within the coming of the Messiah, a change of heart was demanded, otherwise calamity for "his own people did not receive him." John 1:11 (ESV)

Then as now, many find it hard to accept Jesus as Lord. Is it because we need to make that decision to repent and so receive Him, to change our minds, to take hold of all that He offers, by faith, and recognise that he has "saved us...according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit, so that being justified by his grace we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life"? Titus 3:5,7 (ESV)

What is Christmas, all about? Someone wrote: "We love confusedly, we fallen ones; the journey of life is for setting love in order." This is why we need a saviour - setting love in order, healing brokenness, bringing reconciliation, getting connections right, gaining freedom, peace!

Below is a list of 12 simple things that we can do to this Christmas season.

- 1. Spend time with the elderly and the isolated: Whilst Christmas can be a busy time catching up with family and friends, many people can find Christmas to be a lonely experience. Why not call in for a cuppa and cake with someone you know who is isolated? Maybe you could even take them for a trip to the grocery store, or even a drive to see the local Christmas lights
- 2. Be Kind: One of the most cost-efficient (and yet effective!) things you can give this Christmas is the gift of kindness. Everyone likes to receive a compliment, so why not compliment someone on something they've done? Even a simple thank you, or a smile to a stranger on the streets can go a long way!
- 3. Give a bit of spare change: Many store checkouts have donation tins calling out for spare change to help fund good work. Why not consider dropping your spare silver in the tin rather than opening up your wallet or purse?
- 4. Bake a meal: Do you know a busy single, working parent? Why not bake and deliver a meal to give them a night off?
- 5. Help the homeless: With so much new and exciting stuff coming into our homes during the Christmas period, it can also be a good time for cleaning out the closet to make way for new items. Why not consider donating some gently used clothes or toys to your local op shop, or even some old books to your local street library? Alternatively, could purchase some long-life groceries (e.g. canned goods, or hygiene products) and donate them to a food bank like FoodBank.org.au or you could send a once-off donation to a local charity
- 6. Send a money donation: Maybe you've got a little extra spending money this Christmas. If so, why not consider supporting one of the many national or international charities that aim to eliminate poverty?
- 7. Volunteer your time: One of the greatest gifts that we can give someone is our time. Maybe you know of someone with a mobility impairment who could use a hand in their garden, or assistance in getting to a doctor's appointment
- 8. Recycle and make eco-friendly purchases: Whether you're entertaining at home or elsewhere, one of the simplest things you can do is choose to recycle, and / or purchase and use eco-friendly products. Help the environment by choosing to recycle wrapping paper and cards. If you celebrate at the beach or outdoors, choose to use re-usable or sustainable cutlery, plates, and cups
- 9. Give blood: The Red Cross is always looking for donations of blood, plasma, and platelets to help those who are sick. If you're healthy and fit, why not consider making a booking at your local Red Cross centre to donate blood?

TRADITIONAL SHORTBREAD

<u>Ingredients</u>

- 125g butter (softened)
- 1/4 cup (55g) caster sugar
- 1 cup (150g) plain flour
- 1/4 cup (45g) rice flour







Method



- Using an electric mixer, beat the butter, sugar, plain flour, and rice flour in a mixing bowl until the dough comes together
- Preheat oven to 160°C
- 3. Line a baking tray with baking paper. Draw a 20cm circle on the paper and turn over
- 4. Place dough on the lined tray. Using paper as a guide, roll the dough out to a 20cm disc. If desired, use your finger tips to pinch the dough to create a fluted edge. Use a sharp knife to score 8 wedges into the dough, being careful not to cut the whole way through. Use a fork to prick each wedge twice
- Sprinkle evenly with extra sugar. Bake for 30 minutes or until light golden, then set aside on the tray to cool completely









GRANDMA'S FRUIT MINCE PIES

Ingredients

- 1 packet of mixed fruit
- · 1 handful of chopped nuts (optional)
- 1/2 teaspoon of mixed spice
- · 3 cooking apples
- 3/4 kg or 1.5lbs of brown sugar
- · Juice of one lemon
- · 1 tsp of almond essence and vanilla essence
- 1 cup of water
- · 2 tablespoons of butter or margarine
- · 1 wine glass of sherry or spirits
- 1 tablespoon of cornflour
- Sweet short pastry
- · 1 and 1/2 cups of self-raising flour
- 2 tablespoons of sugar
- 4 oz of butter
- · Pinch of salt
- 1 egg

Method



- 1. Peel and chop apples
- Combine mixed fruit, apples, chopped nuts, brown sugar, lemon juice, almond essence and vanilla essence, and 1 cup of water. Bring to boil, and when apple is soft add 1tbsp cornflour to thicken
- To make pastry, weigh out 110g of butter and place in mixing bowl. With the tips of your fingers gently rub butter sugar and flour until combined and resembling bread crumbs. Stir in an eg
- 4. Set mixture aside to cool
- Pre-heat oven to 180°C and cook for 20 minutes.
- 6.Leave to cool

FLEA SEASON

It is now Spring, the time of the year to look out for fleas on your dogs and cats.

You may see the small fleas jumping on your pets or you might see that they are biting or scratching their back and/or loosing patches of fur as a result of the flea irritation. If not treated properly the flea problem could go on for the entire warm season.

So how do you treat fleas? The main thing is that you find something that works and use it as required throughout spring and summer.

You certainly need to keep clean all of the areas in which your pet spends most of their time – especially where they eat and sleep. A good deal of the flea's life is spent away from your pet's coats. For instance, they like dry parts of the garden and inside the house so keeping their area clean is important. You should vacuum where the dog spends time and then throw out the vacuum bag as fleas can breed in those bags!

There are a good many types of treatment for fleas. These include drops you place on your pet's neck, tablets., flea collars and dog washes. If you have a flea treatment that works, keep using it throughout the warm weather.

You should make sure you treat all animals in your house and garden, even if only 1 of them appears to have fleas. Fleas can quickly leap from 1 pet to another so every pet should be treated at the same time.

In addition, it is not just dogs and cats that suffer from flea infestations. If you have other animals, maybe rabbits, guinea pigs or ferrets - they also need checking. However, make sure you buy a suitable treatment that can be used on these types of pets. Not all types of flea treatment for dogs and cats can be used on other animals.

Please see life cycle of the flea in the picture on the next page. The female flea lays eggs frequently so regular checking and treatment is required.

How We Travelled in Melville in the 1940's

I lived in North Lake Road which was narrow and mostly bush with my parents and 6 siblings. Mum and Dad had a Poultry Farm of 13 acres. Our place was a mile from the Canning Highway, the third house on the right hand side. So it was rather isolated. We had to walk up and down the road to catch the bus.

When we were young and going to school we would walk or ride our bikes, that is, if we didn't have a puncture, which would always be happening. The young ones used to have scooters, which we would leave in Atwell's dairy until we came home again. We must have travelled up and down North Lake Road for years and years. We got to know every tree and landmark there was. There was a large wooden shelter with three bench seats around the inside which we called the "bus shed".

Some days we would walk it six times especially on a Saturday and think nothing of it. We would go to work, come home, and then go to the football, then again to the pictures or a dance.

It was a pretty road with lots of Banksia trees, Golden Christmas trees in December. We would decorate the house with the flowers at Christmas time. In spring, the wild flowers were plentiful, lots of orchids and Kangaroo Paws. As we walked to pass the time, we would walk to a particular tree, have a rest, and then head to the next tree we had chosen to walk to.

As we grew older and became teenagers, my sister and I thought we would like to be conductresses on the buses. The Metro Bus Company had its depot in Short St, Fremantle. You could either work on Canning Highway or Stirling Highway, you stayed on that bus run. However, you had to do an exam first, learn every section and every street on the run by heart and what prices to charge. Then an inspector went with you for a test.

The Stirling and Canning Highway buses both left from Cantonment St not far along from the United Church. The last stop was at Government Gardens in the Terrace, then, after a wait of fifteen minutes, they would set off, back to Fremantle.

Once you passed your test the inspector would go with you to Perth and back to see if you were qualified enough. You were also given a driver that would work with you all the time, no chopping or changing.

In those days when a woman with a pram or stroller and children caught the bus, the driver had to get out of the bus cab and hook the pram on the back of the bus, using the hooks for that purpose, they also had to take them off again when the woman alighted. This was done with much courtesy.

Our uniform was supplied. It was made of dark green serge with six silver buttons, a cap to match that had an "M" broach on the front and a bag for our money that was worn over the shoulder and an oblong ticket holder these were made of leather. Because there weren't many cars to be had in those days, the buses were well used by the public. The bus would be quite full and people standing in the isle. I can remember well, asking people to "Move down the aisle please" so we could fit a few more people in.

I liked this work, plus it taught me to broaden my skills, learn a lot about people and life. I have some lovely memories, plus funny ones from that time.

I can see in my mind's eye a young boy travelling from school in Palmyra to North Lake Rd. He would hand me his penny and smile at me with his big blue eyes and defy me to take his money. Because I knew him, he lived just past our bus shed in Canning Highway, I would often let him keep his penny and hope an inspector didn't hop on the bus to check if people had their tickets, which they used to do. The Blue eyed boy was Danny Miller of the Miller family, who became a jockey, well known to Melville people.

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Starting at Holy Cross

My first service was in March 2020 just before Covid lockdown! So, I started again several weeks later. Being 69 at the time and having been a member of the Parish of Joondalup for 27 years, I had no nervousness about meeting completely new Anglicans in a different setting. Sure enough, I could relate easily to everybody and I like to feel that everybody could relate to me. One advantage of a small congregation is that everybody gets to know your name. Jill and Sue were particularly helpful in telling me about Holy Cross and Sue realised that I would like a year off before joining the Parish Council. I felt that for me the balance was right between not being overwhelmed as a new person but on the other hand not feeling that you are being left out of a clique. So, I am here to stay.

"As Craig (Betty's son) explained at her funeral, Betty led a full life in her own rite. Betty loved her family and was very proud of their achievements. She had an AM (Member of the Order of Australia), was committed to working at Red Cross, was a devoted teacher, and above all, a devout Christian. Betty was a member of our church for over 60 years, and participated in all aspects of church life, including being the treasurer of the finances.

One should not forget her devotion to her husband John. John was a Masonic Master of some note, and as such would travel extensively attending conferences (always accompanied by Betty). The tech station in the back corner of the church was donated by Betty in John's memory. They were truly devoted to each other. Betty was a much loved and admired member of Holy Cross, and will be truly issed.

At Mainly Music, we provide a time and place where young children and their carers can find delight in shared experiences through music and play, are accepted for who they are, and can grow educationally.

Mainly music is a place to meet your friends, make new friends, share precious time with your children, sing, dance laugh, cry, welcome new babies, say goodbye to the little ones going off to school, have a cuppa, and a homemade morning tea.

Connecting with adults is so important and we give you the opportunity to connect with other adults (and yes, to be able to finish a sentence or even a conversation!).

Everyone who is part of the family is welcome whether you are a first-time parent, or well-versed one
(yes, even those who have grown up kids!), dads, mums,

The Holy Tennis Court - now and then!

In the 1960s Greta Atkinson managed to get finance to build a tennis court alongside the Church of the Holy Cross, Melville. Later, Norm Kidd took over the reins and managed all aspects of the court, getting friends to help with various tasks (e.g. erecting lights was a big feature to enable folk to play at night!). He also managed to get space at the back of the original church to provide for a pavilion, so players could rest and enjoy a cuppa. In later years even some of the ministers came and shared a drink with the players.

Many people formed small clubs, with the court being well booked, thus providing money to help with the running costs of the Church. Of course, the exercise was good for all as well.

I was part of three different clubs over the years. The second one was when the new court was built when the new Church was erected. Norm Kidd, Pat and Norma Tebbutt, Mel and Pat Austin, and I were church members playing together with others from outside the church.

Besides tennis, the court was also used for parking when any large event had been held, as well as for stalls and entertainment for many years during fete time.

Many balls have been hit over the fences, and some of the neighbours have probably shaken their heads at the number of times balls that have landed all around them (with some even rolling down Williams Court!).

Tennis is good for young and old, male and female, and has certainly been a boon to us at Holy Cross.

The Tennis court is still available for hire with several groups enjoying the quality of the court and its surroundings. You can use the little pavilion or sit out on the grass under the shade of the lovely trees. Balls are still being hit over the fences, and laughter is often heard coming from the direction of the court while folk learn to play and enjoy each other's company.

Partnership in Mission - Parish to Parish Link

The Partnership in Mission between the Diocese of Eldoret, Kenya and the Diocese of Perth began informally in 2011 when two Perth clergy visited Eldoret. The potential of a closer relationship between the two Dioceses was brought back to Perth, and in 2012, Synod agreed that we should pursue the possibility of developing a partnership in Mission. This partnership formally commenced with Bishop Christopher Rutto's visit to Perth in 2014.

Eldoret is located in the northwest of Kenya and has significant rural areas. The Anglican Church in Eldoret is vibrant with terrific human and spiritual resources but limited material resources.

This partnership is one of mutuality and respect. Both dioceses have something to offer with the opportunity to learn from each other while growing in friendship. Holy Cross Melville is linked with Bishop Muge Memorial Chapel, a parish on the edge of the town of Eldoret. We communicate by Whatsapp, sharing everyday parish life, with photos, video,s and stories. We pray for each other on an ongoing basis, often sharing prayer requests.

Through the partnership between the two Diocese 4 other projects were identified:

- 1. Provision of internet and the installation of a voice and data network for the Eldoret Diocese and their community-based rehabilitation centre
- 2. Provision of clean and reliable water for Karbongo Primary school which is owned and operated by Eldoret Diocese.
- 3. Provision of reliable renewable solar installation to the community based rehabilitation centre
- 4. The Disability Inclusion Project

The parish link has enriched our community. It gives a very real and tangible understanding of our worldwide Anglican communion. It gives us the opportunity to share with our brothers and sisters on the other side of the world. Click here to a view a message from our sister Rose in Eldoret

Bottle Top Hill

Holy Cross has been blessed with a very capable and enthusiastic eco-warrior, Emma (a member of Parish Council), whose mission and vision have been to help protect the environment. This vision has resulted in Bottle Top Hill, a joint venture and partnership with the local community, to help us save bottle tops from going into landfills.

Every second Saturday of each month (from 8:00 AM to 10:00 AM) our church is used as a collection point. Bottle Top Hill also provides an educational opportunity for those who are ecologically-minded in the community. Each month there is a new theme to help us learn as we strive to do our bit.

We believe that as a church, and as individuals, that we have a lot to learn about caring for the environment. Our church has started some small projects in the past. For example, we have been collecting milk bottle tops for schools for many years. One example of this has been the collection of bottles on behalf of Paraquad Industries (an organisation supporting people with a disability) which have been deposited through the Containers for Change program, with money earned going to support people with a disability. Another example is that our Mainly Music program has ceased using any plastic wraps - we no longer use paper or plastic cups. Further to this, we started a soft plastic collection which is taken to the local shops for recycling. In fact, even our new digital magazine is a way of engaging with the local Melville community by electronic distribution, as well as limiting the number of hard copies printed.

We have learned a lot from many of our congregation's more senior folk who were born in the 1930s. Many of these individuals lived through the 2nd World War, and out of necessity have been recycling and repurposing all their lives.

As Christians, who are part of the Worldwide Anglican Communion, we have 5 Marks of Mission, with the 5th mark being:

To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth

St. Christopher's in Bicton recently had their Spring Bazaar, which was a perfect opportunity to help collaborate and share the message on this mark of mission. Of course, we know you don't have to be Christian to be aware of sustainability or to care for the environment. However, we, who know of God's love, believe that we have a responsibility to step up and care for Creation. We believe that we must all become aware of the impact of our individual actions. We acknowledge we have a lot to learn, as well as a long way to go before as a church (and as individuals) we can claim to truly live both sustainably and regeneratively.

We give thanks for Emma who is encouraging and teaching us on the journey. We also give thanks for the partnerships with our local community members and the organizations involved. We would warmly welcome any folk who would like to further explore their faith and / or contribute to the 5th mark of mission. So why not bring your bottle tops (clean) and help with the sorting?
